

Aftermath of military interventions by the United States and its European allies



NATO Operation Deliberate Force (Republika Srpska, Bosnia and Herzegovina, August 30 - September 21, 1995)

23 days of lawlessness. Numerous pieces of infrastructure destroyed or damaged. **Depleted uranium munitions** used, causing cancer rates to skyrocket in the most affected areas.



NATO Operation Allied Force (Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, March 24 - June 10, 1999)

78 days of bomb and rocket attacks.

More than 2,000 civilian casualties (including **88** children).

15 tonnes of depleted uranium-238 used in air attacks.

More than 38,000 sorties.

About 200,000 people fled their homes. The total economic damage, according to various estimates, amounted to **\$30 to \$100 billion**.

Bombing of residential areas, rocket strikes, destruction of plants, power lines, bridges, medical centres and educational institutions.



Invasion of Iraq by the United States and allies

More than **205,000** civilians killed, blanket air strikes, more than **1.5 million** refugees, and the city of **Mosul** virtually wiped off the face of the earth.

More than **12 million** Iraqis live below the poverty line.

US and NATO invasion of Libya

Libyan GDP shortfall in 2011-2015 was estimated at **\$216 billion**.
The cost of the Libyan conflict will reach **\$1 trillion** by 2025.



US invasion of Syria

The city of **Raqqa** almost razed to the ground: **11,000** buildings completely destroyed, nearly **80 percent** of the city now uninhabitable.

Washington continues to **hamper the restoration** of Syria in every possible way.
